

## For Men Only

A month or so ago, I was struck by a praise song we were singing at the beginning of one of our Sunday services. While I enjoyed the music and felt like the words were a tribute to God and an affirmation of our corporate faith, something seemed wrong.

We were singing a “love song to Jesus” that struck me as decidedly feminine. The words were no doubt biblical and certainly appropriate to our worship — the problem was that the words had the feel of a romantic ballad that would appeal more to women than to men. Now, I know that I am already in hot water here – like many of you I stubbornly resist gender stereotypes — yet I couldn’t shake the feeling.

So I returned to a train of thought I have entertained many times in my ministry. Is there a difference between men’s spirituality and women’s spirituality? In other words, do men encounter God in ways that are significantly different than women?

It seems that around Father’s Day there is always an article in the Sacramento Bee about men and church. I always read eagerly, hoping to find the secret that will help me understand how my gender approaches God. Inevitably, I am disappointed by stories that talk about churches’ efforts to lure men with Lazy Boy recliners in the front of the sanctuary, sports figures as special speakers, and various gimmicks that seem to trivialize men’s relationship with God. I have found very few insights in how churches have attempted to do “men’s ministry.” Recently, on the popular religion website Beliefnet.com, I followed a discussion thread entitled “Men Don’t Do Jesus.” In our own congregation, I have been struck by the low percentage of men participating in Adult Education opportunities we offer. I am reminded regularly that the church has somehow missed the mark in the area of men and God.

Please understand, I am absolutely NOT writing this article to criticize men in general or the men of this church. Most of us do not need any more unnecessary guilt heaped upon us. What I am trying to do is to wake myself up to the reality of “male spirituality.” Is there such a thing? Is there a middle ground between making football analogies for God’s work and having to sing about Jesus in words that don’t even come close to how we think about him? What are we missing in our conversation about God? How have we failed to capture the imagination of men? Since when did religion and faith become only women’s work?

I am fully aware that there is a great deal of writing about men’s spirituality, from both a general and a Christian perspective. What I am not aware of is whether any of this writing and thinking has made its way into our reality.

As a man, how do you name God, what do you call God? Are there specific ways that men pray? Are there forms of worship that seem to open up the reality of God to you (as a man)? How would you describe men’s spirituality?

I have a trusted and wise friend with whom I have discussed these issues for years. He believes Jesus is the key to men’s understanding of God (I know, you are saying “duh!”). But what he suggests is that perhaps in affirming our “love” for Jesus we have missed something. What many of us need is solidarity with Jesus. Men need Jesus as our brother. An interesting thought....

I am curious what you think, and I would like to invite any of you men (I am serious here folks) to send me an email or share a word articulating your thoughts on men and God. I will look forward to it.

## **Family Promise of Sacramento** **By Steve Caruso *Published September 20, 2007 in the Bee***

The statistics are startling, if not sinful. Families with children are the fastest-growing segment of the nation's homeless population. Homeless children get sick and go hungry twice as often as other children.

Homeless children who are able to attend school -- not always a possibility -- are four times as likely to have developmental delays and are twice as likely to have learning disabilities and to repeat a grade. Nearly one-third of all homeless children attend three or more schools in a single year.

On the health front, homelessness is a direct predictor of devastating childhood illnesses. For every healthy child with a home, there are four homeless children likely to have low birth weight and to need special care right after birth. Homeless children have twice as many ear infections, are four times as likely to be asthmatic and six times as likely to suffer speech and stammering problems.

Since I began my tenure in April as executive director of Family Promise of Sacramento, a nonprofit organization dedicated to assisting homeless families, I've had many people admit they don't give much thought to homeless families. "I see the homeless, and I figure they're all just mentally ill or addicted to drugs or alcohol," one friend admitted sheepishly but candidly. And yet, in the United States, more than 1 million children are homeless on any given night. Read that sentence again. Try to let it sink in. One million children.

At Family Promise of Sacramento, we provide hands-on help to four homeless families at a time. We help the parents develop and implement strategies designed to obtain permanent housing and to break the barriers that have caused the homelessness. Since opening in April 2005, we've helped 151 adults and children. Some have succeeded wildly, while others have unfortunately succumbed to old habits. The Family Promise program is difficult, and it's meant to be that way. Families who ultimately succeed in this program are the ones who say "Enough is enough," who are finally ready to implement fundamental change, and who are sick and tired of worrying about where they are going to stay, what they're going to eat, where they are going to sleep tonight and whether something tragic is going to happen to their family.

The most innovative -- and cost-effective -- twist to the Family Promise program is how we provide shelter to our families. Accomplished through an interfaith hospitality network of 15 diverse faith congregations, each full of loving and determined volunteers, the churches take turns housing our families. Each church hosts all of our families for one week at a time, and the families are transported every evening to the hosting church.

At the churches -- Methodist, Lutheran, Catholic, Jewish, Presbyterian, Episcopal, Unitarian and United Church of Christ -- all the families are provided with a private room and bedding, healthy home-cooked dinners, breakfasts every morning and patient and caring people who spend time with our families. Food for sack lunches also is on hand for the families to make lunches for the following day. Each morning, our families are taken back to the Family Promise Day Center on the Loaves & Fishes campus in the Richards Boulevard area north of downtown Sacramento. Children go to their "home" schools or attend Loaves & Fishes' Mustard Seed School, which may be Sacramento's most outstanding elementary school. The adults work during the day to implement the different elements of the personalized plan drawn up to stop their spiral.

Each family has arrived at their homelessness in ways unique to them. Whether it's substance abuse, anger mismanagement, incarceration or loss of employment, or, in many cases, some combination of those, it usually boils down to a miserable series of bad decisions, often compiled one on top of another.

At Family Promise of Sacramento, we help them to confront the reality of those decisions. We work with them to implement better decision-making strategies, as well as to confront and destroy whatever roadblocks have caused their homelessness.

If it really is true that our children tend to mirror our behavior, then a life lived by parents who -- consciously or misguidedly -- make irresponsible or short-sided decisions is very likely to be repeated by children who unconditionally love their parents.

Here at Family Promise of Sacramento, we're determined to end that hideous cycle. Through the combined efforts of our staff members, board of directors and hundreds of passionate volunteers and supporters, we can do it. One family at a time.



## Compassion Weekend – Everything You Need to Know

Been hearing bits and pieces about Faith's Compassion Weekend?

What's it about? Maybe this will help

**What is Compassion Weekend?** During the weekend of April 19 & 20, 2008, Faith Church will participate in an awesome time of Christian Service to our community, where folks of all ages will join together in service activities that have been chosen by our congregation.

**How will the activities be chosen?** For the past month, Compassion Weekend Committee members have been asking for congregational input about service areas & activities. From that we've created three broad service areas: Environment, Education, and Human Services. Next step: recruit Project Leaders (several) to head specific activities.

**What are some examples of activities we could do?**

Repair facilities at nearby schools, clean up a park, knit blanket squares for project Linus, create resource kits for school children, tutor students, team with Rebuilding Together to work on area houses, put together kits for World Vision or Mustard Seed school, knit caps for newborns, partner with the SPCA or other animal groups, help Seniors with yard or handyman projects, work with school children with disabilities, partner with Sacramento Children's Home, partner with an area retirement home.

**When will the activities be selected?** The Committee and Project Leaders will select project activities based on congregation input. We hope to choose 10 to 12 service activities to take place over the weekend.
